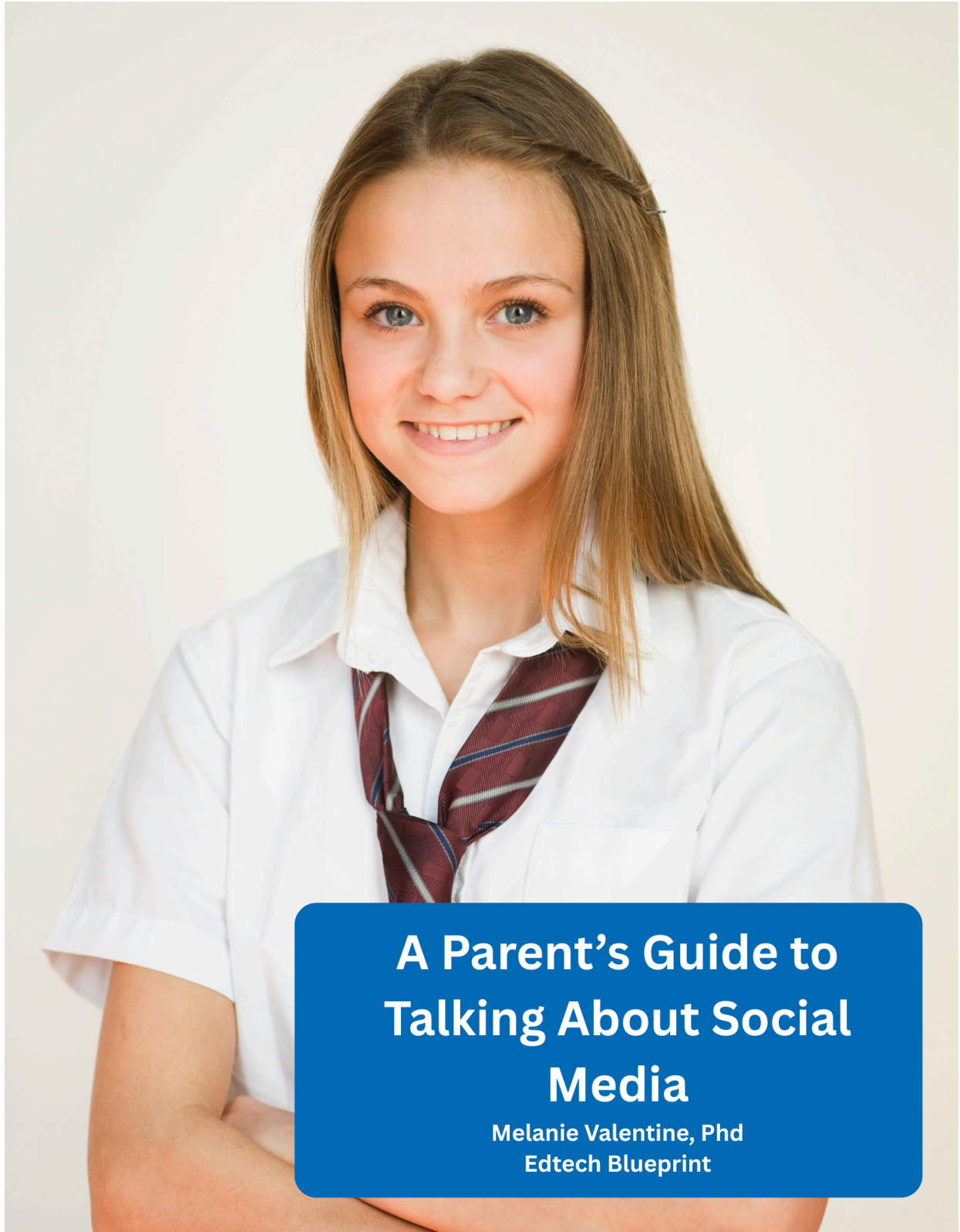

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Guardrails, Not Gates: A Parent's Guide to Talking About Social Media

A Message to Brave Parents

If we completely ban technology, shield our children from the digital world, or pretend it doesn't exist, we aren't protecting them—we are leaving them unprepared. When we lock the gates entirely, our kids don't stop encountering technology; they just stop talking to us about it. They will end up learning the rules of the road from peers, algorithms, or bad actors instead of learning them from us.

As parents, it is our responsibility to get educated on these issues. Because technology is shifting at a breakneck pace, we have to accept a new reality: we must be humble enough to learn *alongside* our children. We don't have to be perfect computer geniuses; we just have to be willing to explore the boundaries together. You are taking a brave, proactive step just by starting this dialogue. Good job for leaning in.

Below are highly targeted social media discussion prompts designed to build an open-door habit of communication before a crisis happens.

The Connection Lab: Social Media Conversations

How to use these questions: Do not turn this into a quiz or an interrogation. Start with the safe, surface-level question to break the ice and get your child talking casually about their digital world. Once they feel comfortable and unjudged, move to the deeper, more probing questions.

Grades 4–6 (Upper Elementary)

- **Surface:** When we type a text message or a game chat, why is it so easy for someone to misunderstand our tone or think a well-meaning joke is actually a mean attack?
- **Deep:** If you see someone being treated poorly or left out in a multiplayer game chat, what is one simple phrase you can use to be an "Upstander" and break the loop?

Grades 7–9 (Middle School)

- **Surface:** Do you think most people our age realize that hit button like "delete" doesn't actually erase a permanent record or a screenshot that someone else saved?
- **Deep:** Applying the "Face-to-Face Filter," if you wouldn't say something to a classmate's face with their parents and your parents standing right there, why does the screen make us feel braver—in a bad way—than we really are?

Grades 10–12 (High School)

- **Surface:** How do you decide where the boundary is between the parts of your daily life that stay completely private versus what you choose to post for the public to see?
- **Deep:** If a close friend was facing intense cyberbullying or harassment online, how would you help them navigate it without letting the fear of losing their device stop them from getting adult help?
